

"No, I've got an idea. We'll make a travois out to two poles and a blanket, just like the Indians do. We'll drag him." The two men pulled the travois over the rugged Siskiyou Mountains, across the Shasta plains and through more mountains before finally reaching he Willamette Valley and the settlement of Eugene.
