#### The Mint

In the early days of a boom town miners and merchants conducted all transaction in gold dust, weighting the price of everything from a drink to a pick handle. There were frequent disputes and suspicions of cheating by both parties.

A few months after gold was discovered in the Rocky Mountains of Colorado three men, E.E. Gruber and brothers Austin and Milton Clark, opened a bank. They traded hard currency for gold dust, shipping the dust east for minting. "We're paying 5% express charge to the shippers, plus another 5% for insurance. On top of that, it takes three months to get back the coins. We can't run a business like that," reasoned Austin Clark. In addition to being a banker, he was an attorney. He informed his partners, "I've looked and found no law forbidding private minting, as long as the coin is full-weight."

Milton Clark was dispatched to Philadelphia to purchase coning equipment and returned with it in ox-drawn wagons. The July 25, 1860 edition of the Rocky Mountain News reported, "The little engine that drives the machinery was fired up, belts adjusted and between three and four o'clock 'mint drops', of the value of \$10 each, began dropping into a tin pail with the most musical chink."

The gold dust of the region's mining camps was stamped "Pikes Peak Gold". The mint operated until the federal government, fearing competition, purchased it. During the three years the Denver mint operated it coined nearly \$600,000 and established a world-wide reputation for the quality of the region's gold.

**Remember to renew your memberships!**

Time to get out the prospecting equipment if you haven't already, If you have a detector make sure you have fresh batteries and try it out before you hit the gold fields. If you have a motorized piece of equipment make sure that you have changed oil, filled with fresh gas and made sure it runs before you get to the claims. Gather all you mining equipment and put it together in one box, tub, crate or what have you so that you aren't running around at the last minute looking for things. Some items you may need. A #2 shovel, gold pans, classifier, rubber boots and rubber gloves if working the common operation, sluice box, high banker, trommel, gas cans, oil, belts for the motors, snuffer bottle, gold vials, and camera. Is your camper or tent ready to go? Pack everything into your pickup and we will see you on the hill the weekend of June 16 & 17 the 1st outing of the year



## LIST OF THINGS YOU NEED

- 1) Different kinds of clothing the Montana weather can be very different
- 2) Shovel and Gloves
- 3) Water
- 4) Food for yourself and the pot luck if you want to put a dish in.
- 6) Snuffer Bottle for the gold split\*
- 7) Chair

How things work up on the Hill during an outing:

It is important to know that we brake down the slice boxes more often then what you would do if you where working on your own. We have found over time this works will with as many different speeds that people shovel.  
Saturday:

8:00 a.m. Head up on the hill.

10:00 a.m. If you are not up on the hill by then it is possible that you will not get a split \* or just a ½ split \*

If you want to be part of the gold split \* you will need to have your name on the LIST \*. It is your responsibility to make sure your name gets on the list not the person keeping the list.\*

11:45 a.m. start clean up for the lunch break.

12:00 p.m. Lunch

1:00 p.m. Meeting in Public Panning Area

2:00 p.m. Back up on the Hill

This is a good time to let you know we like you to work 4 hours. 2 in the morning and 2 in the afternoon... We want you to take as many brakes as you have to. We know that this is not the normal activity for some of us and we don't want anyone to get hurt.

4:45 p.m. start clean up of the evening

6:00 p.m. Potluck \* dinner

7:00 p.m. Gold Split \*

Sunday:

8:00 a.m. Club Sponsored Breakfast

9:00 a.m. Start up on the Hill

11:30 a.m. start the clean up and braking down of equipment that is coming down the hill and stored in the trailer.

12:00 p.m. Lunch

1:00 p.m. Gold Split \*

The outing is over at this point, some of us go back up on the hill to run the left over dirt .This is something anyone can take part of. The gold found will be split between the people that have helped.

\* List- This is a list of the names of the people that have worked up on the hill or in the creek panning concentrates for the common operation. It is your responsibility to get your name on the list not the person keeping the list. All you need to do is ask someone and they can tell you who is keeping the list.

\* Gold Split- All the gold found from the common operation is taken and is split equally between the numbers of people on the list. Then we take numbered poker ships and put them in a bag. WE then pick some one that is not on the list to pick a number out of the bag. This is the position on the list were start. The biggest pieces of gold randomly put on different numbers on the tray. They are never on the same number. As your name is called you will come up and take a chip, then with a snuffer bottle in hand you will go up to the table and the person that did the split. You will give then your chip and they will snuffer your share of the gold. We do this two (2) time on an outing. Saturday @ 7:00 p.m. and Sunday @ 1:00 p.m.
